




Nothing, the conference was all I was informed it was. As a visiting fellow then, I wished I had realized earlier that I should make a presentation application for this year's conference.

From my side, every session of the conference was good. In general I liked a lot to attend it. Only it is important to think about to increase the duration of the presentation. 10 minutes is too short for the researcher and audience to understand the message.

Lack of collegiality from some participants

vigating from the university, where we picked up our keys, to our accommodations was challenging for me because I was unfamiliar with the city. For everyone's convenience, I would advise retaining volunteers at least through the first day. Additionally, I had hoped for more time to tour the city during the conference, but due to its short duration, that was not really possible..

There were some technical problems that significantly delayed the start of the panels, leaving less time for Q&A. The staff members did their best to solve these as soon as possible.

The conference was top notch


Too short; it could've been at least 3 days.


It would be good to offer practical information about travel and accommodation (especially the latter as Neuchatel is quite expensive) a bit earlier.

What needs improvement is the accommodation provided to students. I stayed in a dormitory where the bathroom was not well-maintained, which made it difficult to feel comfortable.



maybe share the online acess more (i did not use it)


Generally it was fine yet surely not very comfortable for everyone I guess

occassionaly had technical glitches, but maybe this is okay.



## Comment about the parallel panels

The composition of panels was fine given that a given scope of topics allows for limited flexibility and compatibility

Presenter was not able to attend. I did not get any feedback on my paper submission either - which seemed like a bit of a wasted opportunity - especially as a scholar trying to work on articles for publication.

Sometimes topics of interest clash making it difficult to attend both presentations.

I would strongly suggest adding some extra time to the panels, maybe 30 minutes or so. Or else make panels with a maximum of 3 participants so as to give everyone the opportunity to better present and discuss their papers


More precise information what written material has to be sent in (after approval), if one does not participate in the best paper award, and what it will be used for.

The academic failure discussion could be more dynamic

Round table was particlarly interesting - specifically the presnetation of the theory. I think the round table could benifit form showing the successes and pitfalls of the model - maybe more practivla examples. e.g. access to data, methodlogical diffuclties. As for the Academic failures workshop, it was well structured and started off pretty strong - but left me a little less optimistic about academia. I think maybe there could have been more on the failures of the academic approach to migration - rather than only on career failure.

More diversity when choosing speakers for plenary events.

The panel on academic failures could have benefitted from at least one non-white scholar as that would have better reflected the diversity of the participants.

I was not able to attend workshops since there was not more room (I received an email the same day of the workshop...a pity). Maybe an online attendance to the workshops would be possible next conference? The stories on failure...there was not such a failure there, at least from my point of view. Researching in and from other realities (let's say, Global South) is really challenging so maybe next conference an experienced researcher from any other country but Europe and North-America (or a central country in terms of knowledge production) may be join a similar discussion.

I appreciate the discussion on academic failures and the inclusive atmosphere. Learned a lot from the speakers' stories.
