**Semantic Contact: Migrants Encountering the Representations of Host Communities**

## **Abstract**

Migration and mobility research is often focused on the physical movement of bodies, and the points of contact when people of different groups or nationalities meet. But, migration necessarily entails a movement and meeting of ideas. How do the ideas that migrants bring with them interact with the ideas that they encounter? The lecture will introduce Dialogical Analysis, as a methodology that enables the detailed tracing of "semantic encounters" and its consequences. Using data from a range of studies, the lecture will explore how migrants talk about the ideas they encounter, specifically the perspectives



that they attribute to their host communities. Group discussion data, in which migrants tell stories about host communities, is analyzed to reveal how host ideas and perspectives are interacted with – dismissed, acknowledged, argued with, laughed at, or embraced. The lecture will trace how geographical movements, and objective encounters, become semantic encounters, as experiences, narratives and voices reverberate in the discourse of migrants.

## **Curriculum Vitae**

Dr Alex Gillespie is Deputy Head of the Department of Psychological and Behavioural Science at the London School of Economics and Political Science (LSE), Editor of the Journal for the Theory of Social Behaviour, and a Director of LSE Enterprise. His research focuses on communication, divergences of perspective, misunderstandings, trust and listening. He is particularly interested in what people can learn from listening to each other and why people often fail to understand, or actively ignore, points of view that are different or challenging.
