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Workshop's Speakers

Ana Teresa Castillo is a well-known local leader on the border between Colombia and Venezuela. A victim of numerous internal displacements and violent deportation, she created the Deredez Association, which supports displaced Colombians, Venezuelan migrants, and victims of sexual violence.

Andreas Perret (nccr – on the move) is a data manager and social scientist. Among other tasks, at the nccr – on the move he is in charge of and coordinates all things related to data visualization. He has previously led the medical hospital statistics at the Swiss Federal Statistical Office before heading the dissemination of public statistics at the social data archive FORS.

Carolin Schurr (University of Bern) is Professor of Social and Cultural Geography. In her research, she investigates how processes of globalization affect intimate life by combining approaches from feminist geography with theories of affect, feminist and postcolonial technology studies, and new debates around the reconceptualization of the body in the wake of new materialism.

Christina Mittmasser (IGG, University of Neuchâtel | nccr – on the move) studied sociology and human geography with a special interest in migration and the (re)production of social inequalities across borders. Motivated to find a creative way to make her research visible and give something back to her research participants, she initiated a comic project, presented at this event.

Dea Gjinovci is a Swiss-Albanian director-producer and founder of the Geneva-based production company Astrae Productions. Her documentaries have been selected for and awarded at several international film festivals. She holds a Master's in Ethnographic and Documentary Film from UCL (University of London).

Doris Niragire Nirere (LAPS, University of Neuchâtel | nccr – on the move) is a doctoral researcher with a particular interest in contemporary forms of governing migration, mobility, social cohesion, and youth. Her doctoral project engages with participative methods, specifically with forum theatre as a form of data collection and knowledge transmission.

Duc-Quang Nguyen has been working as a data/visual journalist for nine years. His field of expertise blends communication and data science, in particular data visualization and data-led reporting. He currently works for the Swiss French-language media Le Temps. Originally trained as a computational biologist, he holds a PhD from Oxford University.

Germán Arango is a filmmaker, screenwriter, and anthropologist. A budding writer, he has publications in different Colombian media. He directed the documentary "Cantos que inundan el río" about the funeral singers of Bojayá, Chocó (Colombia), for which he won the Documentary Award at the Toulouse Latin Film Festival in 2022.







Workshop's Speakers

Jean Leveugle is a comic books author dedicated to scientific dissemination. He is particularly interested in writing stories that foster the understanding of science through the experience and analyses produced by the comic's characters themselves.

Laure Sandoz (IGG, University of Neuchâtel | nccr – on the move) is an anthropologist and migration specialist interested in how mobile people are affected by the internationalization of labor markets and the emergence of flexible forms of work. A comic lover, she enjoys building bridges between science and the arts and integrating emotions into knowledge production.

Nicolas Yazgi is an ethnologist and museologist by training and has taught at the Universities of Neuchâtel and Heidelberg. Today he is mainly active as an author, dramaturge, curator, and creative consultant. He works at the crossroads of different fields: theatre, film, museums, academia, applied research, and cultural action.

Petra Sidler (Fachhochschule Nordwestschweiz FHNW | nccr – on the move) is a researcher and in her doctoral dissertation, she assessed adolescents' mutual acculturation attitudes and their relation to psychological adjustment. To disseminate research findings, she published scientific articles, a book chapter, blog posts, a podcast, and a short film (screened at this event).

Samer Angelone is a filmmaker and founder of the Global Science Film Festival and holds two PhDs in Film Studies and Biology. He works as a jury member for international film festivals and has directed several fiction and documentary films. He teaches courses related to filmmaking and storytelling for scientists at different universities, research institutes, and film festivals.

Yvonne Riaño (IGG, University of Neuchâtel | nccr – on the move) is an Associate Professor and social geographer specialized in migration studies. She is passionate about participatory research methods and uses short films as a means of communicating the realities experienced by migrants, particularly women.
