




## Research Questions

What are the legacies of the extraordinary measures introduced in response to COVID-19 regarding how the governance of human movement is being conceived, implemented, technologically mediated, and lived after the outbreak of the pandemic?

# Crises and the Swiss Asylum Regime, Sélim Clerc

#### Research question

- What do the governing of COVID-19, other 'crises' and their legacies reveal about the underlying logics at play in the Swiss asylum regime?

#### Methodology

Observations, interviews, socio-historic approach

#### First findings

 COVID-19 as one 'crisis' within a continuum of crises. Policy response to these crises often relies on an alteration of the infrastructure of the asylum system.

# Categorising Key Workers, United Kingdom, Eloise Thompson

#### Research question

- How and to what effect has the categorisation of key workers since the outbreak of COVID-19 been entangled with socio-spatial dynamics of care work in the UK?

#### Methodology

 Mapping, expert interviews, document analysis (qual + quant)


#### First findings

Category of key worker bounded by and produced through COVID mobility regime.
 Through mobility, it acts ambivalently - as both a challenge to and reinforcer of inequalities and privileges.

### Contributions to NCCR



**Hierarchical approach** to the Migration-Mobility Nexus: we study the construction and governance of mobility regimes during and since the COVID-19 pandemic, and examine the ways in which the policy response to the pandemic affects, in the long run, the ways of governing, framing and interrelating differing types of movement.



Crises as social constructions based on objectifiable events: we look at what the framing of the COVID-19 pandemic as a "crisis" enables, in terms of representations, practices, experiences and governance of mobilities of people. We consider the legacies of crises both as empirically objectifiable 'socio-historical' processes and as processes of narrative construction.
