Workshop Description

This two-day workshop, organized within the framework of the Swiss National Center of Competence in Research – The Migration-Mobility Nexus at the University of Neuchâtel, brings together researchers working on forced migration from a relational perspective and seeks to advance understandings of agency and liminality based on empirical research. The workshop aims to rethink forced migration through a relational lens and to broaden our understanding of how forced migrants cope with uncertainty, precariousness, and liminality by situating them in broader social relations, networks, and contexts. It also encourages debates on methodological and ethical issues and problems that arise in empirical research with relational, transnational, and bottom-up perspectives. War-induced forced migration due to the Russian invasion of Ukraine and the war in Syria are two empirical cases that we will be focusing on, but research on other displaced populations will also be presented.
